Student Eligibility

Students must be remediation-free in accordance to one of the assessments in the [Uniform Statewide Standards for Remediation-Free Status document](#)

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College Readiness Indicators – assessment thresholds to guarantee “remediation free” status at any public post-secondary institution in Ohio

A student who meets or exceeds the following thresholds will be deemed as remediation free and eligible to enroll in a college credit-bearing course at any of Ohio’s public institution of higher education.

Student Eligibility

Conditional Eligibility (see handout)

- If scores within “conditional range” AND has a 3.0 GPA, then student is eligible to participate
 - **OR**
- If scores within “conditional range” AND obtains a recommendation from a school counselor, principal or career-tech advisor, then student is eligible to participate

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College Credit Plus: Student Eligibility Assessment Testing

Effective Academic Year 2018-2019, a student interested in College Credit Plus must be considered eligible to participate.

- A student is considered **Eligible** for the program if the student scores at or above the “Assessment Threshold Score” in at least one subtest of an approved assessment exam* in the table below.
- If a student does not score at the Assessment Threshold Score in at least one subtest, but has scored within the “Score Range to be Considered” (calculated as the standard error of measurement), then the student can be considered **Conditionally Eligible** for the program if he/she also meets one of these criteria:
 - ✓ Has a 3.0 cumulative GPA or
 - ✓ Receives a recommendation from school counselor, principal, or career-technical advisor

Assessment Tests

- Requires institution of higher education to pay for one assessment to determine student eligibility

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YSU Eligibility Test - Accuplacer

- Pending final approval by Academic Senate on December 6
 - Students test in English, Math and Reading and must meet the scores listed in the state SEM's
 - Students who are eligible, but still not meeting course placement requirements, will be offered YSU placement exams
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YSU Eligibility Test

- **Who should take the Eligibility test?**
 - **ONLY** students who have **NOT**
 - taken the ACT/SAT **OR**
 - met the ACT Composite 17 or SAT combined score of 910
- **How do students register for testing?**
 - Students call the CCP office (330-941-2447) and should be prepared to provide name, address, phone, email address and what school district they are enrolled in

YSU Eligibility Test

➤ **QUESTION FROM COUNSELOR DAY**

- Will YSU accept Accuplacer scores from other higher education institutions?
- **YES!** Provided that the higher education institution emails the scores directly to the CCP office (ccp@ysu.edu).

YSU Eligibility Test – Deadlines

➤ Deadline to **Complete** Eligibility Testing

- Non-public school students, regardless of term – March 20
- Summer 2018 – March 20
- Fall 2018/Spring 2019 – April 20

➤ **What if our application day is prior to the deadline?**

- Students can still apply. Once the results come in, and provided it was completed by the deadline above, we will decide eligibility and notify the student

Eligible Courses

Chancellor (Ohio Department of Higher Education) and Superintendent (Ohio Department of Education) adopt rules specifying which courses are eligible for CCP funding


ORC 3365.06



Eligible Courses - Overview

- Tiered System (Level I, II)
 - Students complete 15 hours of Level I before moving on to Level II (with few exceptions)
- Certain courses are exempt
- Secondary Schools must track course type and hours


Eligible Courses - Definitions

- **Level I** = courses that are either transferable, in computer science, information technology, anatomy or physiology that is not eligible to be a transferable course, a technical certificate course, or a course as approved by the Chancellor
 - **Level II** = a college course that is not a Level I course
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Eligible Courses – Student Progression

- Students must complete 15 ch of Level I courses before enrolling in any Level II courses
- **Exceptions:**
 - Upon successful completion of a Level I course in a specific subject area, a student may take a Level II course in the same subject area
 - Example = Math 1570 & 2670, Applied Calc 1 (OTM) & 2 (not OTM)
 - May enroll in a Level II course that has a Level I course as a prerequisite if the student meets the universities course placement guidelines for the course
 - Example = Math 1552 (complete Math 1510 or Level 45 on placement)

Eligible Courses – Non-allowable Courses

- One-on-one private instruction, including but not limited to instrumental music, voice or art
 - Courses for which college course fees exceed an amount established by the Chancellor (amount TBD)
 - Study abroad or similar course
 - Physical education course
 - Courses graded on a pass/fail or satisfactory/unsatisfactory bases unless the course is transferable
 - Remedial or sectarian courses
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Eligible Courses – Non-allowable Courses

- Courses as determined by the college/university to contain adult content and inappropriate for students under a certain age
 - *Once identified, the courses will be listed on our website*
- Courses that are more than a semester in length, unless the course is delivered in a longer timeframe on the college campus
 - *High school based courses must follow a semester calendar; will still use the alternate start/end dates*

Eligible Courses – Student Notifications

- Secondary schools include information about eligible courses in the information and counseling sessions and track the number and type of courses students are enrolled in
- **How will you know what is a Level I course?**
 - Colleges/Universities are required to post on website
- **What if the student is not enrolled in the appropriate level course?**
 - Secondary school notifies the student/parent that the student must either withdraw or be self-pay


Underperforming Students

Chancellor (Ohio Department of Higher Education) and the Superintendent (Ohio Department of Education) adopt rules specifying conditions under which an underperforming participant may continue to participate in CCP

ORC 3365.091




Underperforming Students - Overview

- Secondary Schools responsible for placing an underperforming student on CCP probation
 - Limits the number, and type, of classes a student can enroll in
 - Schools develop a CCP Probation Policy and Appeal Process
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Underperforming Students - Definitions

- **Underperforming student** means a student who meets at least one of the following conditions:
 - Cumulative college grade point average of lower than a 2.0
 - Withdraws from, or receives no credit for, two or more courses in the same term
- **Ineligible student** means a student who meets the definition of an underperforming student for two consecutive terms of enrollment

Underperforming Students - Policy

- Secondary Schools responsible for placing an underperforming student on CCP probation
 - Notifies the student, parent, each institution of higher education that the student is enrolled
 - Advises the student, parent on requirements for continuing in the program
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Underperforming Students - Policy

- Student shall enroll in no more than one college course in any term
- Student cannot enroll in the same subject area as a college course that the student earned a grade of D, F or for no credit

Underperforming Students - Policy


- **What if the student enrolled in classes for next term prior to being placed on probation?**
 - Student shall un-enroll from appropriate courses as necessary to comply
 - If the student does not, the secondary school, upon receiving the pre-term roster, will notify the student and parent that the student is self-pay for the course **AND** that the student will be ineligible for, and dismissed from, CCP for the next term

Underperforming Students - Policy

- **How does a student come off CCP probation?**
 - If the sole class the student enrolls in raises the cumulative college GPA to a 2.0 or higher, the student shall be removed and participate without restrictions
 - If not, student remains on probation for a second term
 - If after a second term, the GPA still remains below a 2.0, the student is dismissed from the program

Underperforming Students - Policy

➤ **How is a student dismissed?**


- Secondary schools are responsible for dismissing, notifying student, parent and each college/university the student is enrolled
 - If the student is already enrolled for the next term at the time of dismissal, the student must un-enroll from courses
 - If not, upon receiving the pre-term roster, the secondary school notifies the student and parent that the student is self pay for the course **AND** that the dismissal from the program shall last for an additional term
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Underperforming Students - Policy


➤ **Question from Counselor Day**

- If a student enrolls in two higher education institutions, does the secondary school combine both college GPA's to determine if the student is placed on CCP probation for low GPA?
- Per Dr. Harper at ODHE, the school district will combine the two GPAs in order to determine whether the student is below 2.0 – all CCP courses are indicated in the rule. As for at which institution the student should enroll, that is up to the student. He/she may be also impacted by the IHE's academic policy if the GPA is low there. The student just has to dis-enroll from all but one course at one institution.

Underperforming Students - Policy

- Secondary school is responsible for developing a policy that defines the academic progress a student must achieve to be reinstated in the CCP program on either probation or without restrictions
 - Must state that failure to make academic progress as defined in the policy will result in an extension of CCP dismissal
 - Must also include an appeal procedure (outlined in proposed OAC 3333-1-65.13)
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Underperforming Students - Policy

- Secondary schools must include information about CCP probation, probation, dismissal and appeal in the information session and counseling session
 - Each college/university designates a staff member to monitor student performance and discuss available resources for assisting students at risk of probation or dismissal
 - Nothing in this rule shall supercede, alter or otherwise affect any college/university policies and procedure on academic probation or dismissal. Each CCP student is still subject to said policies.

Student Appeals Processes

April 1 deadline

- Changes the appeal process if a principal does not approve consent for a student to participate
- Appeals can be made by student to the school district superintendent or governing entity
- Establishes that the decision of the superintendent or governing entity is final

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Student Appeals Processes

Grade disputes

- Changes the appeal of grade dispute decisions between a school and a CCP participant from the State Board of Education to the Ohio Department of Education

ORC 3365.12



Annual Notice Deadline

- Changes date to **February 1** for secondary schools to provide information about CCP to all students in grades six through eleven
- *Change aligns the law (still said March 1) with what was placed in policy last year*
