Recommendations for Faculty Administering YSU "Student Course Feedback" Surveys

(Formerly Student Evaluations of Teaching)

Passed by Academic Senate Feb. 2024

In a Face to Face or Online Synchronous Course

Set aside class time—whenever possible—for the completion of the survey.

- Ideally, select that last ten minutes of a class session to ensure participation.
- According to Berk (2013) your student response rate should be 70% or higher for summative faculty evaluation, if combined with other sources of information such as a teaching portfolio, chair observation, etc.
- Because our institutional response rate is lower (around 50%) after moving to online student feedback, academic senate approved the process of returning to the in-class method we used several years ago to improve those response rates.

The Goal: To Give Students Voice and Strive for Improvement

- Encourage the truth.
 - Do not use incentives (food, extra credit) for students to complete evaluations. It's unethical to (even if tempted) attempt to sway your students to be kind or positive.
- Standardize the process to reduce bias.
 - Instruct students how to locate your course survey from their devices via email or blackboard.
 - Stress the importance of reading the survey directions.
 - Ask students to refrain from discussing their responses with others; this is a personal and private way to express thoughts individually. Emphasize that every student's voice is important and valued.
 - Excuse yourself from the room for the remainder of the period.

In Asynchronous Courses

Considerations:

- Try to replicate as much of the above as possible.
- Create a short video to go over where to locate the survey, and follow its directions (and/or)
- Write brief instructions in an announcement to students explaining the survey's location and importance.

In Future Semesters, Consider Implementing an Anonymous Mid-Semester Survey

- Midterm assessments can boost end of the semester scores.
 - You could use the same items found in the YSU survey or design your own questions.
 - One popular midterm survey is "What would you like me to stop, start, and continue?" where students simply offer their thoughts on those three prompts.
- Consider student responses then discuss student answers with your class.
 - demonstrate your interest in ensuring a good course experience.
 - If you can't or aren't willing to adjust something about the course, explain why.
 - If you can make adjustments based on reasonable requests, your willingness to listen and be flexible will be appreciated.
 - Changes might just make future semesters better for everyone.

Iterative Improvements to the Survey
